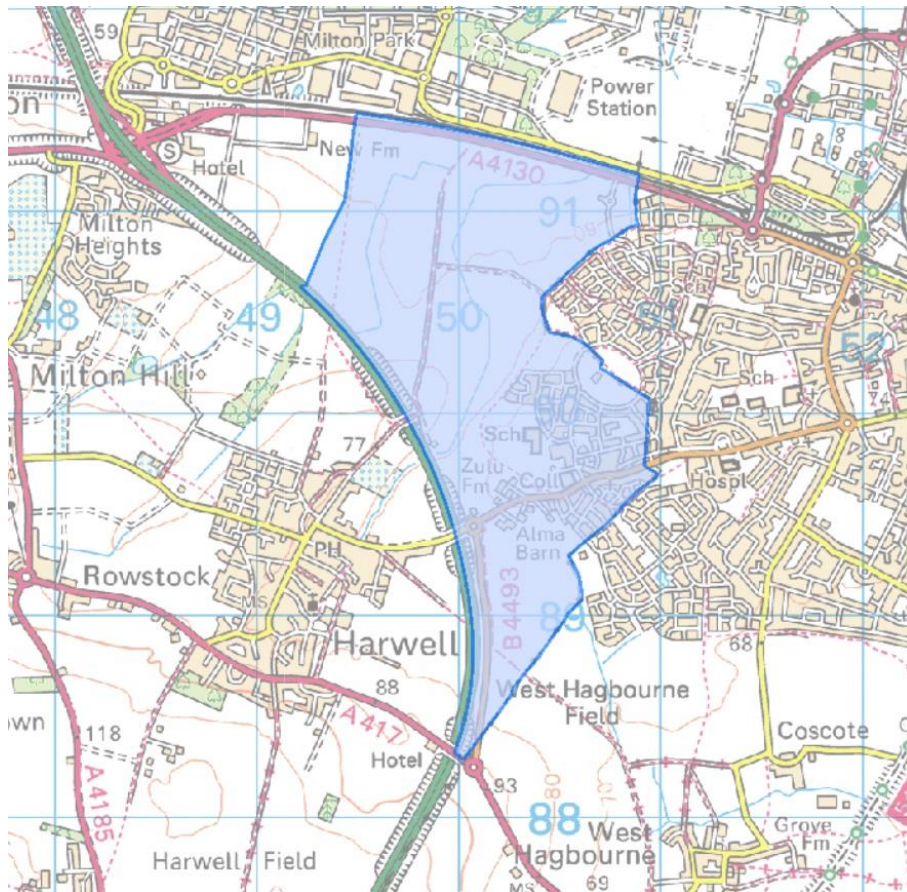
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Parish Council

In many parishes, the Parish Meeting is a chance for all our local groups and organisations to tell us what they have been doing this past year, and hopefully a bit of what they plan for the future. In 2024, our inaugural Parish Meeting year, many of the groups our community members belong to are affiliated to other parishes, and so this report pack is a little lighter than other parish reports you may have seen before. Please encourage any groups you are involved with to get in touch with the parish council, so they can take part in future years..

For those who may still not know, 1st April 2023 was the creation date of the new civil parish of Western Valley, encompassing many of the homes in the Great Western Park Development, and the future Valley Park development. Formerly part of the Parish of Harwell, Western Valley sits between Didcot to the East, and the A34 to the west. The Great Western Park Residents Association campaigned for many years to not be managed by the Parish of Harwell and to have our own identity, and in 2023 that ideal became a reality.



Shortly after our creation there were parish elections across the Vale of White Horse and soon we had 5 Councillors and a meeting was held to approve appointing a Chairman, adopting a Code of Conduct and hiring a Clerk for the day to day management of the Council.

July soon arrived, a Clerk was appointed, 3 more councillors were co-opted and the Council settled down to the business of creating and approving policies and responding to planning applications. For a parish with approximately 1,500 electors, our precept is quite low and we currently have a very short asset register. We are however putting in place everything we need to grow and support the Parish as it rapidly expands due to the Valley Park development.

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As a Council we are very aware of some of the big issues, and they have appeared on our Council agendas through the year:

- Medical Provision
- Public Transport
- Anti-social parking
- Speeding
- Allotments
- Burial Ground / Cemetery
- Parish Office
- Noticeboards

Some of these items are long term projects, other we can have little influence over, but we are campaigning and with the support of our District and County Councillors we are pushing to get some action. If you have any suggestions of “big projects” or ideas of what you want to see in the parish as it grows, please get in contact with the Clerk. Some of these items will be a long time coming, and will hopefully address the real need in our community over time.

Our most recent internal auditor’s report included many positive comments including the statements:

“The first meeting of the council was in June 2023 and the progress towards proper governance and compliance is excellent.

The council is on a sound footing for future growth. I found the records and systems of the council to be in very good order.”

As the first tier of local government, the processes can seem quite bureaucratic and at times daunting. It is reassuring that our administration is recognised as being well done and as a parish we have started in the right direction to have an effective and efficient Council.

As we head in to our first full Council year, it is important for all to remember that each elected or co-opted member volunteers their time and seeks to do what is best for the whole community. At times it can be a very difficult job, with little reward, and I thank those who joined the Council with me this year for their time and efforts.

County Councillor Report

What's been happening

The biggest change to the division in the period was the **Electoral Commission review**, which confirms that Hendreds & Harwell is one of the largest and growing divisions in Oxfordshire and as such in 2025 electoral year it will be split into 3, so 3 councilors will represent the area, and it combines / splits out with other areas....

1. Harwell, Western Valley – becomes one division
2. Charlton, Kingsgrove, Ardington & Lockinge, East and West Hendred, Chilton, Upton and Blewbury is another
3. And finally Steventon groups with Drayton, Sutton Courtney and Milton parishes for the final division.

As many of you will know, I have an ever-increasing workload and now you can see why. The reality has been I simply just haven't had enough time to do everything, and I have always prioritized Casework and individual needs as well as emergencies and large pending issues, sometimes over attending Parish Council meetings. I hope you will see that this is because our residents really matter, even though many of these are confidential matters I cannot discuss. I appreciate your understanding and am and have always been available rapidly by phone / text.

It won't surprise you to know I haven't been serving you all quietly, but I have had a major blip this first part of 2024, firstly a fire at a property we rent for my partners art and my pottery and we had to move out, and I have had whooping cough and am still getting better, 3 months later, just need less rain and mud. Meanwhile I will keep asking the questions no one else wants to ask and serving you the best I can. I have taken a break from Facebook for a while, as just find it's overwhelming and not good for my headspace.

Another change was in **December 2023 I left the Group**, the administration group, of Liberal Democrats and continue to sit on OCC as an Independent. My frustration with poor decision making, strategy and direction was long voiced inside the group and I tried to influence where I could, but it was clear the voices of my residents and our rural communities were falling on deaf ears, especially around transport, roads and our most vulnerable. **I am now the Leader of TIVOO – The Independent Voice of Oxfordshire**, and will continue to represent in an open and transparent way. I have realized that politics doesn't help anyone, and we need more voices that are just about the right thing for our residents and not about getting reelected or political point scoring.

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This May sees elections for the Police and Crime Commissioner. We have tried on several times in the division to get some actions on...

- Speeding and poor driver behaviours
- On street parking, blocking access for active travel users
- Anti Social Behaviours
- More police presence / preventative policing.

Please think about your community and who best can represent your views when you vote this may and please remember voter ID. This is a huge role, and also pays a huge amount of money for the individual, the website says £88,600 for PCC in Thames Valley!

Roads – we have had a long battle around the HIF1 infrastructure and its now in Public Inquiry. I have represented public views at the hearing and we expect an outcome end of the Summer 2024. HIF1 is a new proposed road from Western Valley / Valley Park to Culham, with bridges / fly overs. We all know the local congestion and flooding issues and this scheme is funded by government as part of the Tory led growth deal, which resulted in the huge number of new homes in the locality. Budgets – I am afraid I didn't agree with the new OCC budget and the final deal done with Labour and the Lib Dem Green administration. I had no issues with the administrations budget, but once again Labour came in with fantasy spends on feasibility studies and cuts in real time costs to Adult Social care. Its hugely disappointing after a nearly 10 hour meeting, that the ideas of all groups were not considered, **all** the main parties had some brilliant options for the residents of Oxfordshire, but as always politics is a horrid game which doesn't put people first! I voted against the final budget.

Children – I have worked closely since September 2022 with parents, carers and users of Oxfordshire's SEND services (Special Educational Needs and Disabilities) and now sit on the new EYP (Education and Young Persons) Scrutiny Committee. In September 2023 Oxfordshire failed its Ofsted on SEND alongside the Health Authority (as there's joined services between health and education). I continue to voice concerns at all levels and support some of our families in the division on a daily basis. It's a hugely complex area and once again plenty of government failings, but, there is plenty of issues inside OCC and with a new Director of service we are starting to see some rapid changes, although not rapid enough for many of our families with complex needs.

SESRO – we continue our fight and I continue to voice concerns at the highest levels, this could be a report in its own right. I recently spoke at the Clay Compaction Trial planning application which was called into Planning Committee and was very disappointed by the material planning considerations by the committee members, and it was passed pending county archology recommendations due to a find. Thames Water continue to pollute the Letcombe and Ginge brooks and frankly are leaving our infrastructure to crumble. I have written to the Secretary of State to call for a Public Inquiry into the Thames Water Management Plan and got a cut and paste reply, and similarly continue to call for the MP, David Johnston, to meet with local residents, neither are coming to fruition. I promise to keep trying and keep SESRO on the agenda at OCC, where the council remains in staunch objection.

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Flooding – We have and continue to suffer from freak weather events, and this has had a continued impact on Steventon especially. In January 2024 after Storm Henk, I organized a public meeting and we formed a Community flood group. Things continue to build and I couldn't be prouder of what the parish is achieving and the number of volunteers taking the reins. We have more to do, but we have a foundation and have met with the Environment Agency and councils around remits and working together, funnily enough Thames Water have been late to the table and lack lustre, despite the amount of human effluent we have had in homes, gardens and streets.

Citizenship – I am a big believer that we are the answer to most of the worlds problems and that the system is broken beyond repair. I am hugely proud of being a part of helping some set up (and volunteering* when I can at...)

1. Roots & Shoots Steventon – Community café and allotment
2. HEG Community Larder and Café – East Hendred
3. Harwelcome – Harwellian (Harwell) – and a special thanks to ex Cllr Sarah Medley for all her hard work and Debbie G!
4. Hendred Community Cinema nights
5. Upton Community events – well done Nicola for all you and the teams hard work!
6. The Chiton Market is making its appearance again, and is always a wonder on the triangle!

I really want to know what's going on in your parishes, so please do let me know, and if I can be of any assistance.

Councillor Priority Fund – this sadly looks like its coming to an end, which is a tragedy, as it's the only lever we have to help, as councilors, small groups, I do have some funding left, and will share my spending soon, so far an Accessible Trampoline in Chilton, Mental Health First Aider training for teachers in the division, Compost Toilet for Parkinson.me in Ardington, West Hendred Village Hall – hire costs for small groups and Set up costs for Steventon Community Flood Group. Do chat with me, I have allowed some money for Toad Ladders too for Ardington Toad Patrol.

Steventon Bridge – yet another failure of multiple agency ownership / operation, the last correspondence I got from chasing up works (remember we have had a channel now since Dec 2021), was as follows; *' The design of the proposed repairs is largely completed, but the works programme is down to the available possessions and Milestone our term Consultant/Contractor have been struggling to get a response from Network Rail. Milestone are seeking a response again from Network Rail, before escalating through the County Council to try and get a response. If only Network Rail rules of the route possessions are available, i.e. Saturday night into Sunday mornings, then it is expected that 25 of these possessions will be required to complete the work. The works are desired to start this summer, however even rules of the route possessions generally need to be booked at least 16 weeks in advance. It is hoped that we can carryout the work on the back of longer planned possessions by Network Rail, such that far fewer rules of the route possessions will be required. To book our own longer possessions, Network Rail typically require 2 years notice, with weekend long possessions typically costing around £300,000. There are also likely to be complications over the Public Liability Insurance requirements for these works, for which the Council and our contractors are normally required to have £10m insurance cover, but Network Rail are likely to seek higher cover in this instance, which will add significant cost and complications which may also delay the programme. i.e. for other planned works Network Rail are requiring £150m PLI insurance which is costing an extra £380,000. The proposed*

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works to Steventon bridge are probably higher risk to Network Rail than these other works, for which a suitable PLI limit, which primarily relates to risk of disrupting train operators still needs to be agreed."

I can provide you with a more definitive update once a suitable response from Network Rail has been obtained.

If you are reading this in the same vein that I am, this is utterly bonkers especially given the last line access, that Network Rail arrived late, and the team got barely a few hours work done. Its just another shambles of private v's public operating.

Highways – we have several schemes we are waiting on consultation, including the West Hendred crossing, which is stalled. I am trying to find out why, appears it's the Milestone contractor and further tree surveys.... I am pushing weekly. Blewbury, pending again more safety reviews of Bessel's Way and London Road / A417 for crossing for children, I will keep asking, the new way we are supposed to communicate with Highways isn't working in my opinion and I am pleased to see Cllr Waine has put a question to council for tomorrow saying exactly this (April Full Council).

POTHoles – you may have seen the notice that OCC budgeted an extra £7m and this is being rolled out now. <https://news.oxfordshire.gov.uk/7-million-road-resurfacing-programme-to-begin-next-month/>

I have been impressing that what we really need is the Land Rental and also we need more foremen and people who inspect the Highway after permits have been issued, as contractors and utility companies leave things in a mess!

Active Travel - Finally you may already be aware of this, and if it is of interest, colleagues in our Active Travel team host a monthly Active Travel Roundtable which is open to all. The meeting is intended for those interested in walking, cycling and wheeling across Oxfordshire - to share news, spark debates and foster collaboration between residents, officers and councillors. We have completed the Upton cycle project and crossing and am in constant debate about the Icknield way. Also the Steventon Active Travel up to the lights and down to Milton Interchange will be completed by end of 2024.

Full Council and motions – I have pitched many motions and seconded a fair few in the last 12 months, in fact tomorrow (16th April) I am seconding and proposing motions, one on removal of community beds post hospital care and the other around the voice of the young person in SEND improvement. I have posted questions from the Steventon Bridge to Lack of transparency and openness.

Didcot Healthcare / GWP Medical Centre – I am sure Debra and Hayleigh will have updated as much of this sits with the District, but I am 1) appalled that CIL money has been committed without a public say so, or even the parishes, towards a gap in funding, and effectively to pay a developer to do their job...(and they will own and lease the building to the healthcare service so they will make ££) and that 2) I have been trying to get the CEO of the ICB to meet with Upton / Harwell and Western Valley parishes but they think the microsite is enough to answer all our questions, I have pushed back! OALC – I am the Oxfordshire CC representative, and I am really excited about the Town and Parish Charter, and what this can mean to support local councilors, I am concerned through that Vale of White Horse seems to have direction from their leader not to support, which is of a great concern.

District Councillor Report – Blewbury & Harwell Ward

Here is our annual report for 2023/24. We will outline a few highlights of the past 12 months, some achievements and what the big ticket items for the near future are.

As you may realise, the Vale of White Horse District Council had elections in May 2023 where Hayleigh was re-elected and Debra newly elected to represent the ward of Blewbury and Harwell – which includes parishes of Blewbury, Harwell, Chilton, Upton and new for this year, Western Valley.

As in previous years, the concerns of residents are often centred around the delivery of amenities for the area as we grow and in particular, healthcare. At the July full council meeting, Hayleigh raised a question to cabinet members about the planned Great Western Park (GWP) Health Centre ([see written Q and A here](#)) and back in December, Debra spoke at the Oxfordshire Joint Health Overview & Scrutiny Committee meeting to raise the issue of healthcare provision in and around the Didcot area, where she challenged Dan Leveson, the Place Director for the Buckinghamshire, Oxfordshire and Berkshire West Integrated Care Board (BOB ICB) to give reassurances that the health centre planned for GWP will be built and asked him what is causing the delay. The officers at the council have been working closely with the healthcare provider and we are pleased to say that there has been significant progress behind the scenes, which you can read about later in the report.

This year, Debra served as cabinet member for Leisure Centres and Community Buildings and Hayleigh as Chair of the Climate Emergency Advisory Committee and a member of the scrutiny committee.

We would like to thank the individuals and organisations who give so much of their time to support the community, as it is you that makes the community what it is. Local Issues

Didcot & Villages Healthcare

The Buckinghamshire, Oxfordshire and Berkshire West Integrated Care Board, known as BOB ICB, is responsible for delivering healthcare in the local area.

BOB ICB approved a business case for the project in January 2024 which reaffirms their commitment to deliver the health centre and agrees the revenue funding. Woodlands Medical Centre have been selected to

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run the surgery and the ICB have selected and are working with a third party developer. Read more about the business case approval [here](#), on the ICB's website.

In terms of what we as councils can influence, the Vale is currently working with Taylor Wimpey on measures to take transfer of the site. Once the site is transferred to the council, we will enter into an agreement for lease with the Woodland Medical Centre's third-party primary care developer who will develop the facility (upon grant of planning permission) and then lease it to Woodlands Medical Centre.

A deed of variation was agreed on 7th March. The variation adds additional information to ensure that the health centre can be delivered using the third party developer approach, which would not have been possible under the original S106 (a legal document outlining what the developer provides).

On 1st March, the Cabinet member for affordable housing, infrastructure, development and governance at the Vale, Cllr Sue Caul, made the decision to approve the use from the 20% CIL public healthcare allocation of the infrastructure proportion. CIL stands for Community Infrastructure Levy and is money collected from developers. It can be spent on any number of local projects and this pot of money is allocated generically for healthcare. This is in addition to the S106 money ringfenced specifically for the GWP surgery. [Click here](#) to read more about it.

The council have been working with BOB ICB and encouraging them to be more transparent and share information with the public. For now, there is this [dedicated microsite](#).

The next steps are for the land to transfer to the Vale and for BOB ICB to work with their developer to submit a planning application for the surgery, which we hope to see both happening in the next few months.

Valley Park

Valley Park is a proposed new housing development of 4254 homes, situated on land to the west of Great Western Park and east of the A34, which received outline planning permission in 2021.

In our monthly parish reports we provide an overview of the current live planning applications for Valley Park. There often are several live applications relating to the development, however those labelled 'RM' i.e. 'Reserved Matters' are typically the most noteworthy as they request planning permission for specific parcels of housing on the development. Residents can provide comments on these applications.

Despite the outline permission going through almost three years ago, permissions for homebuilding are only just starting to be given. A parcel of homes for Persimmon was given permission last year, and at the time of writing, the first parcel of Taylor Wimpey homes will go to planning committee in mid-April for a decision. Part of the reason that these parcels take so long to get permission is due to the statutory consultation period – the period of time that residents and specific bodies (such as Environment Agency or Highways) can comment and feedback on applications. The officers go through all the feedback and also check if the application complies with both national planning policy as well as our own local planning policy and then they ask the applicants to make amendments to comply with this. This can often take several rounds before there is an application which meets our standards.

For example, the most recent parcel of Taylor Wimpey homes will be much more environmentally friendly, with solar panels and heat pumps instead of gas boilers.

Boundary Review

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The Local Government Boundary Commission is reviewing the ward boundaries within the District Council, to make sure councillors represent approximately the same number of electors, and that ward arrangements help the council work effectively. It wants to be sure that its proposals reflect community ties and identities. The Commission is the independent body making this decision, but takes feedback from residents and the council itself on what changes, if any to make. Changes made will be in place at the next local election for the District Council, which is May 2027.

Climate & Environment

Climate Action Fund 2023/2024

A total of 14 organisations including parish councils, climate community groups, a pre-school and a drama group were collectively offered more than £56,000 from the Vale's Climate Action Fund to help with a wide variety of projects, which aimed to save energy, help nature recovery or educate residents on how they can help tackle climate change. The projects listed below are the ones from our ward area.

Organisation	Description of project
Blewbury Parish Council	Installation of at least two electric vehicle public charging points at Blewbury Village Hall, to assist EV users to charge their vehicles in the village.
Little Pippins Pre-School in Harwell	Installation of solar panels on Little Pippin's pre-school building.
The Harwellian Club	Project to set up and install interactive displays showing information and advice about the Harwellian Club's energy usage and the recently installed solar panels at the Harwellian social club.

Leisure centres install fan-tastic new energy saving measures

In December 2023, the Leisure Facilities Team presented a [report](#) to the Climate Emergency Advisory Committee about the fantastic work they have been doing to decarbonise our leisure centres. The council declared a Climate Emergency in 2019 and pledged to become a carbon neutral council by 2045 and to have a 75% reduction in carbon emissions in the district by 2030. Our leisure centres made up 51% of the council's carbon emissions in 2019/20.

Since then the council has successfully applied for and been awarded SALIX funding from the government to add solar panels and heat pumps to our leisure centre buildings. Whilst also progressing smaller projects such as updating the lighting to LED lighting and thinking of ways to be more efficient with energy usage. For example, the council has just completed the installation of 11 destratification fans at the White Horse Leisure and Tennis Centre, in Abingdon. These are designed to stabilise the temperature at the pool by deflecting hot air, which has risen to top of the high roof, back down to the lower area where the pool users are.

Before the fans were installed, the pool's heating system had to work harder to maintain a comfortable temperature for swimmers at pool level, while the heated air naturally rose to the highest point in the building and heat was then lost through the roof.

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The Leisure Team have used a combination of capital expenditure where projects are smaller, and S106, CIL and grants for larger projects. This has enabled the Leisure Team to ensure the additional capital has not been used from our reserves and maximised the use of developer funding.

Current data indicates that these smaller projects have already saved 113,152 kWh per year and with the larger projects, overall annual consumption will have reduced to 2.03 kWh per year from the 7.41 kWh per year seen in 2019/20. Over 72% reduction in kWh consumption will have been achieved by 31st Marh 2025.

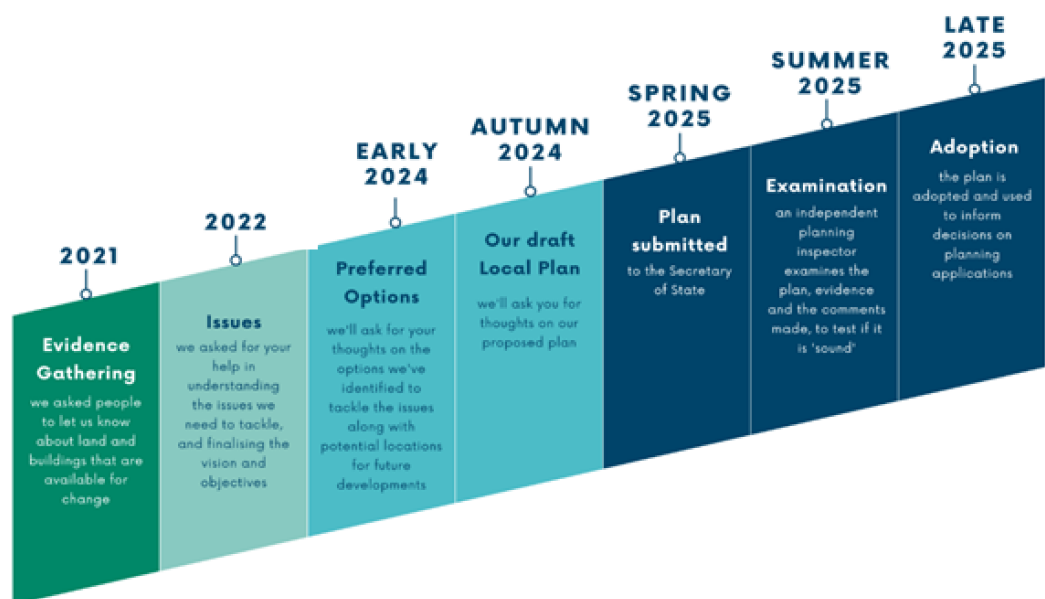
Joint local plan

Vale of White Horse and South Oxfordshire district councils are working together to deliver the Joint Local Plan, which will guide what kinds of new housing and jobs are needed and where they should go.

Earlier this year, the two district councils collected the community's feedback on councils' proposed plans and draft policies across a range of topics, including climate, housing and jobs, environment, community facilities and more.

Determined to reach more people than ever before, the councils used innovative online engagement tools and held a variety of community events in unique and interesting locations to reach people who haven't commented on local plans in the past, as well as those who regularly engage with council planning consultations.

Testament to these innovative methods, around half of those responding to a *Joint Local Plan in a Nutshell* survey said it was their first-time taking part in a local plan consultation.



It doesn't stop there, this is just one stage of the process and there will be more opportunity to engage with the creation of the plan to make it the best it can be. The diagram demonstrates that the next step, later this year, is to ask for your feedback on the draft plan before it is submitted to the secretary of state. The policies that go into this plan, once adopted, are the basis for future planning decisions and any planning application that is submitted, whether for something small, like one home, or whole new estates.

Council Budget 2023/24

Despite major challenges, including below inflation funding increases, the cost-of-living crisis and ongoing economic and political uncertainty, thanks to careful financial management, the council has guaranteed vital

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public services, such as the district's Community Hub which provides support to residents who are struggling financially, and will continue to invest in key areas which benefit people across the district.

For 2024-25, council tax for services provided by Vale of White Horse District Council has been set at £156.69 for a Band D property for the entire year. Vale residents will therefore continue to pay one of the lowest rates in the country for services provided by a shire district and significantly less than the equivalent fee paid by those living in Oxford.

The district council's services are funded, in part, by only a small portion (7 per cent) of the total council tax paid by Vale households. This represents excellent value for money for residents, helping to pay for services, such as: household waste and recycling collections, community support, leisure services, parks and play areas, housing services, planning services, environmental health and licensing.
